Course Outcome(s):

Follow protocol when responding to emergencies.

Objective(s):

- 1. Identify the appropriate procedure to follow when reporting an emergency.
- 2. Explain the emergency evacuation procedure for the Dental Hygiene area.
- 3. Differentiate among the various types of emergency situations.

Course Outcome(s):

Become familiar with the basic requirements included in the Occupational Safety and Health Adminstration's (OSHA) Bloodborne Pathogens Standard.

Objective(s):

- 1. Differentiate clinical procedures and equipment into the appropriate category; engineering control, work practice control or personal protective equipment (PPE).
- 2. Explain the Hepatitis B vaccination protocol.
- 3. Discuss the components of a Post-exposure Management Protocol.
- 4. Locate a copy of the Bloodborne Pathogens Standard and explain its contents.
- 5. Explain the epidemiology and symptoms of bloodborne diseases.
- 6. Identify the modes of transmission of bloodborne pathogens.

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- 7. Describe the contents of an employer's exposure control plan including the location and how the employee can obtain a copy.
- 8. Indicate tasks and activities that may involve exposure to blood and other potentially infectious material (OPIM).

Become familiar with the basic requirements included in the Occupational Safety and Health Adminstration's (OSHA) Hazardous Communication Standard.

Objective(s):

- 1. Locate a copy of the Hazardous Communication Standard and explain its contents.
- 2. Identify the consequences of exposure to hazardous chemicals in the workplace.
- 3. Identify various methods used to detect the presence or release of a hazardous chemical in the work area.
- 4. Identify ways employees can protect themselves against hazardous chemicals.
- 5. Interpret each category of a Safety Data Sheet (SDS).
- 6. Explain the Globally Harmonized System (GHS) of classification and labeling of chemicals.

Course Outcome(s):

Become familiar with the basic requirements included in the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's (OSHA) Respiratory Protection Standard.

Objective(s):

- 1. Locate a copy of the Respiratory Protection Standard and explain its contents.
- 2. Explain the purpose of a respirator.
- 3. List the limitations and capabilities of a respirator.
- 4. Explain the proper use of the respirator in emergency situations including when the respirator fails.
- 5. Demonstrate how to inspect, don, check the seal, use and doff the respirator.
- 6. Explain the procedure for maintenance, storage and disposal of the respirator.
- 7. Recognize the medical signs and symptoms that may limit or prevent the effective use of the respirator.

Course Outcome(s):

Describe the requirements of an infection control program in dentistry.

Objective(s):

- 1. Demonstrate hand hygiene procedures.
- 2. Practice the proper procedure involved in donning and doffing personal protective equipment (PPE).
- 3. Explain the protocol for cleaning, disinfecting and barrier-wrapping dental units.
- 4. Describe the protocol for dental unit waterline maintenance.
- 5. Identify acceptable pre-exposure, exposure and post-exposure infection control protocol during radiographic exposures.
- 6. Identify the steps involved in instrument processing.

Objective(s):

- 1. Locate a copy of the Radiation Safety and Instruction Manual and explain its contents.
- 2. Recall the location and use of radiation generating equipment.

- 4. Identify the individual responsible for radiation protection in the Dental Hygiene Program.
- 5. Explain the responsibility of operators of radiation equipment to report malfunctions.
- 6. Describe Safe Operating Procedures for the Tri-C Dental Hygiene Program.

- 1. Define basic philosophical terms in the study of ethics including theories, principles, values, duties and rights applicable to the provider-patient relationship.
- 2. Explain the purposes of the American Dental Hygienists' Association (ADHA) and its Code of Ethics.
- 3. Discuss the Core Values of ethical behavior.
- 4. Differentiate between an ethical issue and an ethical dilemma and explain the steps involved in the process of resolution.
- 5. Summarize the components of the Dental Hygiene Process of Care.
