Methods of Evaluation:

- 1. Quizzes and tests about the short stories and novels to demonstrate comprehension.
- 2. Individual presentations and group discussions to analyze and synthesize the themes of the short stories and novels.
- 3. Writing assignments to summarize, express personal reactions, and analyze the themes of the short stories and novels.

Course Content Outline:

- 1. Students will read fiction and non-fiction short stories and novels.
 - a. fiction novels will include personal interest novels, mystery novels, and short-story anthologies.
 - b. non-fiction novels will include biographies and novels about history.
- 2. Students will discuss the short stories and novels in small groups and in individual presentations to demonstrate their comprehension of the themes of the novels.
- 3. Students will discuss the short stories novels in writing to summarize, express personal reactions, and analyze the themes of the novels.
