- 2. B. Extend use of wa-ei, ei-wa, and kanji reference dictionaries.
- 3. C. Further understand the composition of kanji and kanji compounds.
- 4. D. Read short functional texts (such as schedules, advertising, and travel brochures) and longer texts (2 5 pages) with increased comprehension, being able to answer questions about the text in Japanese.
- 5. E. Write assignments, quizzes, and exams in Japanese.
- 6. F. Write short compositions, such as texts giving directions, notes of invitation and thanks, postcards, and description.
- 7. G. Listen with greater comprehension and interpret received messages in the light of Japan's socio-cultural norms.
- 8. H. Understand and participate in everyday conversation, expressing such concepts as obligation, duty, permission, admonition, and prohibition in a way acceptable to the Japanese.
- 9. I. Use transitive and intransitive verbs.
- 10. J. Use verbs of giving and receiving, and understand how the proper use of these verbs as governed by Japanese social-cultural structure.
- 11. K. Speak about topics such as travel and sightseeing, transportation, automobiles, housing, and hospitality.
- 12. L. Make negative requests, make suggestions and offer advice.

- 14. N. Make reservations and purchase tickets.
- 15. O. Make inquiries regarding housing.
- 16. P. Invite and serve guests, and behave properly as a guest.
- 17. Q. Explain the function of gift-giving in Japanese society.
- 18. R. Demonstrate sufficient mastery of pre-intermediate Japanese grammar.
