Objective(s):

- d. Recognize professional behavior that would be considered unethical by a majority of "reasonable" professionals.
- e. Discuss professional behavior in relationship to the ethical considerations and potential therapeutic outcome.
- f. Recognize and explain how massage therapist behaviors might enhance and/or compromise the physical, mental and/or emotional health of a client.
- g. Identify, explain and understand the emotional/legal implications for establishing a personal-intimate/sexual relationship with a client.
- h. Recognize and explain legal practices, standards or practices and ethical practices.
- i. Discuss legal and ethical dilemmas.

Utilize proper sanitation and hygiene methods for the massage therapist.

Objective(s):

- a. Demonstrate hygiene and sanitation in massage therapy environment.
- b. Define and explain the concept of universal precautions

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- c. Recognize the current recommendations from the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Chapter 17.
- d. Describe appropriate personal hygiene for a practicing massage therapist in their professional office setting or anytime applying a massage procedure.
- e. Identify potential sources for transmission of pathogenic organisms.
- f. Identify and explain the means for preventing transmission of pathogens in a therapeutic environment.
