A study of songs of exemplary songwriters of the past three decades such as Bob Dylan, John Lennon, Paul Simon, Keith Richards, Joni Mitchell, Chuck Berry, Van Morrison, Pet Townsend, Ray Davies, George Gershwin, Sammy Cahn, Richard Rogers, Duke Ellington, Johnny Mercer, Cole Porter, Irving Berlin, Henry Mancini, Qunicy Jones, Herbie Hancock, and others
  - b. Artists" views of song in regards to creation, purpose, and message
- 3. Creation
  - a. Development of creative process and individual style
  - b. Discussion of original works
