3. Apply appropriate rhythmically notation to demonstrate the imaginary bar lines by completing prepared workbook assignments.

4. Create drum notation to express a variety of styles including swing, Latin, rock and funk in workbook assignments and independent projects.

5. Create appropriate bass lines in a variety of styles including swing, Latin, funk, and rock in workbook assignments and independent projects.

6. Create appropriate guitar notation to express a variety of styles including swing, Latin, rock and funk in workbook assignments and independent projects.

7. Create appropriate piano/keyboard notation to express a variety of styles including swing, Latin, rock and funk in workbook assignments and independent projects.

8. Create a concerted musical arrangement that notates and expresses accurately the role of piano, bass, guitar, and drums in a rhythm section.
