Applied Piano Minor IV

Catalog Description:

Fourth level private piano instruction for music major with piano as minor instrument. Development of technical facility, rhythmic control, phrasing, stylistic interpretation and sight-reading skills. Development of standard repertoire including selected solo and method literature for fourth semester. A juried end of semester performance is required.

Outcomes

Course Outcome(s):

Acquire and develop advanced/intermediate skills in ear training, traditional and contemporary/jazz harmony, composition, arranging, songwriting, and vocal/instrument performance using applied minor piano as a learning and foundational tool.

Objective(s):

1. Perform one traditional piece and one contemporary piece from advanced/intermediate solo repertoire. Both selections should be memorized.
2. Perform any major or minor scale from any degree two octaves with multiple articulations in eight notes M.M. quarter note=100.
3. Sight-read and show improvisational and "comping" skills; for example, a jazz piano arrangement/ big band chart. [Jazz Studies]
4. Successfully sight-read a short selected intermediate level piece.
5. Show in performance expanded voicings over ii/V/I progressions in all major and minor keys. [Jazz Studies]
6. Show rootless chord voicings for ii/V/I progressions in all major and minor keys. [Jazz Studies]
7. Perform "Bird" Blues with appropriate chord voicings, all keys. [Jazz Studies]

8. Perform American Standard Song(s) with appropriate left hand accompaniment and right melody and improvisation. [Jazz Studies]
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Methods of Evaluation:

1. Ongoing review and evaluation of skill level by instructor on session-by-session basis
2. Performance of solo literature and method material before a jury of music faculty at end of semester
3. Evaluation of solo performance and/or student recital before a live audience
4. Participation in master classes

Course Content Outline:

1. Technical facility
 - a. Basic techniques of hand, finger, and wrist motor control and touch development
 - b. Improvisational techniques and skills using Aebersold's Vol. 25, 17 All-Time Standards and Vol. 3, The II/V7/I Progression [Jazz Studies]
 - c. Syncopated pedal and una corda pedal
 - d. Sight-reading skill development
2. Stylistic and performance practices
 - a. Harmonic and melodic improvisational skills [Jazz Studies]
 - b. Stylistic interpretation in early music and modern solo repertoire
 - c. Memorization: analysis and comprehension of musical form
 - d. Musicality and technical facility through performance of selected solo literature before a live audience
 - e. Psychological and physiological problems of performance
 - f. Extended and altered chord voicings [Jazz Studies]
