Catalog Description:

Examine Rules of Courts which govern civil lawsuits, with emphasis on the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure. Analyze and apply Ohio laws and rules pertaining to commencement of action, service, motion practice, and discovery issues (including rules pertaining to e-Discovery). Distinguish between federal rules, Ohio rules, and county local rules. Students begin portfolio of legal documents developed throughout program of study, including the creation of an electronic case file.

Objective(s):

- 1. Create formal and informal legal documents pertaining to client intake, witness statements, and reports, from initiation of the civil action to post-trial procedures.
- 2. Identify and restate the sequence of events in a case from client intake to judgment entry.
- 3. Determine the legal options for collecting on a judgment, including garnishment, personal property liens, and real property liens.

Apply service requirements for pleadings and motions utilizing the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure.

Draft various discovery requests, subpoenas, and motions, applying their purpose and significance to civil litigation situations.

- 1. Draft discovery documents, including interrogatories, requests for production of documents, requests for admissions, along with supporting discovery motions, including a motion for a physical or mental examination.
- 2. Draft and apply the intended use, including demonstrating the use of timeframes and compliance with form requirements in the creation of motions to compel, motions for summary judgment, and other procedural motions.
- 3. Draft and utilize subpoenas for non-party testimony and evidence.

Identify and apply the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure governing amended complaints, class actions, and the form of pleadings, motions, and other legal documents.

Identify and apply the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure governing discovery, including depositions, interrogatories, requests, motions, and the rules of court pertaining to e-Discovery.

Objective(s):

- Apply the procedural requirements for electronic discovery, including rules regarding privilege, as defined by the Ohio Revised Code and the Ohio Rules of Court.

Course Outcome(s):

Create and maintain a client case file, in both manual and electronic form, containing all documents pertinent to the case.

Objective(s):

- 1. Create a sharable folder that contains all the formal and informal documents pertaining to a claim.
- 2. Organize and populate the case folder in the proper order for attorney productivity.

 - a. Create and maintain an orderly file in both manual and electronic form, containing a Client Intake Form, the original complaint, the answer, an additional pleading, interrogatories, production of document materials, and motions.

 - Summary of Facts Project. Student will define a civil litigation action, identifying parties, causes of action, timeframes, and location of injury.
 - b. Client Intake Form Project. Student will create a Client Intake Form which will identify jurisdiction, venue, causes of action, time frames, addresses of parties, and elements of the action.
 - c. Complaint Project. Student will create a Complaint, Instructions for Service, and Designation Form suitable for filing in Cuyahoga County, using the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure.
 - d. Answer Project. Student will create an Answer, along with Certificate of Service, using the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure.
 - e. Local Rules Project. Student will identify distinctions between the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure and local county rules.
 - f. Production of Documents Project. Student will identify documents and information which must be included in a Party's initial disclosure and subsequent discovery, as defined by the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure, along with the creation of a subpoena to obtain a document from a non-party, utilizing the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure. Student will identify possible situations regarding privilege, use of protective orders, defenses of undue burden and expense, and the relevance rule as applied through the doctrine of proportionality.
 - g. Interrogatory Project. Student will create interrogatories for a party, including the Definition and Instructions sections, as defined by the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure.
 - h. Motion Project. Student will create motions applicable to their civil litigation cause of action, utilizing the Ohio Rules of Civil Procedure.
