Outcomes

Course Outcome(s):

Interpret and analyze various ethical theories.

Essential Learning Outcome Mapping:

Critical/Creative Thinking: Analyze, evaluate, and synthesize information in order to consider problems/ideas and transform them in innovative or imaginative ways.

Written Communication: Demonstrate effective written communication for an intended audience that follows genre/disciplinary conventions that reflect clarity, organization, and editing skills.

Objective(s):

1. Apply aspects of theories and topics to practical problems and successfully argue for a position.
 2. Contrast the deontological and teleological types of justification.
 3. Give an account of a teleological theory such as Mill's or Aristotle's.
 4. Give an account of a deontological theory such as Kant's.
 5. Develop the rationale for an intuitionistic metaethics such as Moore's.
 6. Develop the rationale for a non-cognitivist metaethics such as Ayer's.
 7. Explain Sartre's version of existentialism.
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Course Outcome(s):

Interpret and assess the historical development of ethical theory.

Essential Learning Outcome Mapping:

Critical/Creative Thinking: Analyze, evaluate, and synthesize information in order to consider problems/ideas and transform them in innovative or imaginative ways.

Cultural Sensitivity: Demonstrate sensitivity to the beliefs, views, values, and practices of cultures within and beyond the United States.

Objective(s):

1. Explain the concept of ethics and the goals of descriptive, normative, and metaethics.
2. Account for the rise of existentialist theory in this century.

Course Outcome(s):

Differentiate between ethics and other fields of philosophic inquiry such as metaphysics as well as other general fields of general inquiry such as psychology.

Essential Learning Outcome Mapping:

Critical/Creative Thinking: Analyze, evaluate, and synthesize information in order to consider problems/ideas and transform them in innovative or imaginative ways.

Civic Responsibility: Analyze the results of actions and inactions with the likely effects on the larger local and/or global communities.

Objective(s):

1. Examine the differences between ethics and other fields such as psychology and sociology.
2. Distinguish scientific studies that are primarily descriptive from prescriptive analyses that are commonly associated with ethical analyses.
3. Differentiate ethical theories that contain meta-ethical elements from those that are not meta-ethical in character.
