 - b. Accusative singular- animate and inanimate
 - c. Irregular plural
 - d. Genitive singular and plural- possession
 - e. Prepositional plural-location
 - f. Accusative plural-direct object
 - g. Dative singular and plural indirect object
- 2. Basic grammar: adjectives. Function: Describing people, objects and places.
 - a. Prepositional singular and plural. Function: expressing location of people and objects
 - b. Accusative singular and plural. Function: describing people, objects and places
 - c. Genitive singular and plural
 - d. Dative singular and plural
 - e. Russian last names that decline like adjectives
- 3. Basic grammar: verbs
 - a. Irregular verb "TO BE"
 - b. Verbal aspect: perfective and imperfective. Function: ability to distinguish between continuing and completed action.
 - c. Using adverbs of time with verbs
 - d. Stress
 - e. Future tense of imperfective verbs
 - f. Future tense of perfective verbs
 - g. Second conjugation of verbs
- 4. Basic grammar. other
 - a. Intonation in sentences with contrasting and coordinating conjunctions
 - b. Accusative case in time expressions
- Basic grammar. numbers (Russian grammatical category). Function: ability to describe amount or quantity of objects or people.
 a. Accusative and genitive of cardinal numbers (1-10, 11-19, 20-100, 101-1000)
 - b. Accusative and Genitive of ordinal numbers (1-10, 11-19, 20-100, 101-1000)
- 6. Basic grammar. pronouns. Function: describing people and objects with pronouns.
 - a. Accusative singular in possessive pronouns
 - b. Dative singular and plural in possessive pronouns
 - c. Accusative singular in demonstrative pronouns
 - d. Accusative singular in interrogative pronouns
- 7. Basic grammar: syntax. Function: distinguishing between statements and questions with emphasis on a particular word in question in complex sentences.
 - a. Word order and punctuation in subordinate clause
- 8. Basic grammar: prepositions. Function: talking about events, people and things.
 - a. Prepositions B and HA with nouns to express location
 - b. Preposition 3a with Accusative case
 - c. Preposition 6e3 followed by Genitive case
 - d. Preposition после plus Genitive case
